

As has been consistent in past polls, this study is dominated by the smallest businesses. A person with 2 employees has the same say as one overseeing 200 in this study.






Kansas Economy on the Right Track?



While still negative, we see a substantial uptick in opinion about the direction of the economy among business leaders.




Kansas Economy on the Right Track?



We see improvement across the state. The greatest leaps, however, are seen in the agriculture and construction sectors.




Most Important Issues for Kansas Business (Open Ended)



Workforce Size Over Next Year


4% Increased substantially; 18% Increased moderately; 66% Stayed the same; 10% Decreased moderately; 3% Undecided

Greatest Concern with Kansas Workforce?



38% More Funding; 51% Improving Performance; 11% Undecided




We continue to see a majority of business leaders focused on improving performance and rigor than in getting more money to schools.

74% Agree; 17% Disagree; 9% Undecided




We continue to see business owners saying there is too much focus on administration as opposed to on student achievement. This is a strong message.



Get more than 55% of education dollars to classrooms


77% Favor; 12% Oppose; 12% Undecided

Best Economic Growth Program?




This year, we see an increase in those saying reducing the government driving costs is the key to economic growth, reversing a four-year decline. We also see a break in the trend of wanting increased incentives, but also a continuation of decline in those seeing increasing school spending as the best economic growth plan.

50% Too Much; 7% Not Enough; 41% About Right; 2% Undecided




After seeing the "Not enough" rise to double-digits, it has dropped back down to 7%.



How Much Should Be Cut?

10% Never Cut; 17% Cut Up To 5%; 18% Cut 6% - 10%; 13% Cut More Than 10%; 26% Never Raise; 16% Undecided




We see the "Never raise taxes" crowd growing while the "Never cut" crowd is diminishing. In fact, those who would raise taxes before cutting more than 5% is the lowest we have seen it since 2011.



Change State Sales Tax?

11% Increase; 38% Decrease, 49% Stay the Same; 2% Undecided




Those wanting to decrease the state sales tax continue to grow, though it is not as high as we saw it in 2015.



Change Personal Income Tax?

10% Increase; 36% Decrease, 51% Stay the Same; 3% Undecided




We see a reversal in the four year trend that had seen a decline in those wanting the personal income tax decreased. While still a far cry from the 2013 numbers, this question again shows the increase in tax sensitivity.



Change Property Tax?

4% Increase; 61% Decrease, 34% Stay the Same; 1% Undecided




Of all the taxes tested, the greatest desire to decrease comes in property taxes – and this is increasing. The rural west continues to lead the charge in wanting property taxes lowered.



Institute a Sales Tax on Professional Services?


23% Favor; 71% Oppose; 6% Undecided

Would it Help the Kansas Economy to Lower Taxes?




Six in ten Kansas business leaders say lowering taxes will help the economy.



Would it Help the Kansas Economy to Lower Taxes?



38% Strongly Agree; 24% Somewhat Agree; 13% Somewhat Disagree; 12% Strongly Disagree; 13% Undecided




In the west and southeast, we see the strongest sentiment for improving the legal system.
